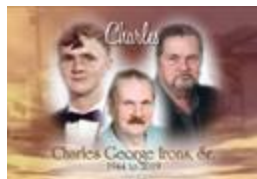

“ Charlie was one of my mom's (June [Wymer] Oxman) favorite nephews. He came to visit us out on the west coast when I was about 10, and he was about 20 years old. We were baseball fans, and he helped root for our home team, the LA Dodgers, who had transplanted from Brooklyn. He optimistically felt our team would win the pennant and go on to the World Series. Charlie was an artist, and sketched a t-shirt design with the team logo proclaiming the championship in advance of the finals. He patiently explained how the printing process works, and transferred his design to a linoleum block to ink and print t-shirts. If our team won, we were going to make a million bucks selling shirts to other fans. Charlie told us about his gal back home, and how she stood out in a crowd. I learned a lot about devotion from him, even though romantic love was just a concept. I knew Charlie because our family had returned to Toledo for a visit in 1958, when I was 5. We took the train across country, and Charlie's dad, my Uncle Roy, and Chuck Wymer, my mom's brother, who were both engineers, offered me a ride in the cab. I refused, irrationally, because of a scene in the movie King Kong, where the brakeman can't stop the train in time by turning the wheel brake, which seemed like a steering wheel. I was so glad to know that Charlie later on in life had followed in his dad's footsteps to a career on the railroad. June would proudly transmit the birth announcements of all of Charlie & Marie's kids as they were born, so the importance of family was cemented in the lives of the Oxman kids. I especially felt a kinship with his daughter Mickey, as that was also my nickname at the time. Thanks, Charlie !
