“ To Skip, and all of Judy's family and friends -

I write this tonight from my dressing room at the St James Theater in New York, where I am the Music Director/Conductor of the new Broadway musical, "Something Rotten". This is my ninth Broadway show. I doubt that I would be sitting in this room right now if it wasn't for Judy. There is a lyric in our show that says "There's nothing as amazing as a Musical !" Truer words were never spoken.

I think that I saw my first musical in 1969 - a production of "Camelot" at Tiffin Columbian High School, and I believe that it was the first (of many) musicals that Judy directed there. Quite simply, I was hooked. Happily for me, during my senior year at Columbian, she decided to do a "revival" of "Camelot." Even today, after conducting more than 80 different musicals, it remains one of my all-time favorites. Judy taught us so much about the theatre. Not only the stagecraft and the acting and the technical parts of it, but even more importantly, the JOY of the theatre. She loved it. We discovered that mystical bond that you somehow form with each and every company. She taught us that when it was show-time, there was "magic to do". We all had "parts to perform" and "hearts to warm". Personally, I consider myself one of the luckiest guys on the planet, because 36 years after my last show with Judy, I still get to do musicals every single day. What we did for fun, what we did for joy, "what we did for love", I am blessed to be able to do every day. I thank her for that.

Judy had this charm bracelet that she always wore backstage during performances. She would "jingle it" to give us energy, to remind us about our pacing, to cheer us on, and to show her support. So, tonight, this boy from Tiffin, Ohio, will walk to the conductor's podium at the St James Theatre, raise his arms to give the downbeat, and dedicate this performance to "Miss D". I'll be listening for that charm bracelet from offstage, but probably won't hear it. Luckily, tho, I'll know that she's still jingling that bracelet, cheering us on, just like she always has, and in my heart, always

will.
